
## Welcome

#### Welcome to The Link and my favourite edition of the year.

We reiterate regularly the importance of improving outcomes and making a difference to the lives of our young people. At primary and secondary we are above the national average and significantly so.

This results edition pulls together in one place the impact of our combined efforts.

We recorded our highest ever GCSE outcomes for Grades 4+ and 5+ in English and Maths combined.

The higher level was achieved by 51% of our students, 4% higher than our previous best recorded 12 months ago.

At Grade 4 or above, the figure was 71%, a 3% increase on a year ago.

The increase for the most disadvantaged students also rose sharply by 7% for 5+ combined and 5% for 4+ combined.

This year's results across primary, secondary and Post 16 are a testimony to the hard work and dedication of our students and staff. **Thank you.** 

This success allows us to build further momentum.

It was a pleasure to be at a special Trust event at The Vale Academy and launch our 'Brigg Grammar Stream'.

It will be confirmed as North Lincolnshire's top-performing school for 4+, 5+ and EBacc. Its Grade 5+ figure in English and Mathematics of 64% was 28% higher than its nearest school and 26% above the county average.

We need to shout louder in Brigg and all our schools about our achievements and overall Delta offer.

The chance to learn Latin, enjoy funded residentials, take part in the Duke of Edinburgh scheme and join a gifted and talented science programme is a big deal.

My message to prospective children and their parents was simple – why should great opportunities only be available to children in private schools?

We can and will provide the benefits found in the private sector without the fees and a grammar stream option without selection.

We make no apologies for being aspirational, for wanting the best for the children across our Trust.

English saw 80% achieve the mark while in Maths it was 63%.

Other subjects also saw impressive numbers reach Grade 5+.

Geography recorded an 11% year-on-year increase to 57%. History saw the figure at 61%, French 58% and Computing 73%, with 43% gaining 7+.

Principal Jaspal Mehat said: "I am really proud of our students who have secured an outstanding set of results this summer.

Results like these do not come without hard work and commitment so, as I say well done to our young people for putting their all into these exams, I would also thank the staff team for their consistent dedication and support for our students

throughout their time at the Academy.

This is a team effort so parents should take credit too."

Among the individual successes, Richard had a clean sweep of top grades, including seven Grade 9s, and will study A-levels in Maths, Further Maths, Economics and Chemistry in the Academy's Sixth Form.

Matthew received eight Grade 9s, one 8 and one 7.

Six Grade 9s in Physics, Maths, Geography, Chemistry, Biology and Maths were achieved by Reed.

Marshall received six Grade 9s, three 8s and a 7 while Niamh secured two Grade 9s, one 8, five 7s and a 6.



# Top level grade numbers up

Numbers of students achieving top level grades at Darton Academy increased across Ebacc subjects.

Highlights saw the percentage of Grades 7 to 9 improve by 10% in Biology, the same figure in Chemistry and 18% in Physics.

Grade 4+ was achieved by 82% with 69% gaining Grade 5 or above. In Maths, 67% recorded Grade 4+ with 49% converting to Grade 5 and above.

Principal Kirsty Holt said it had been a proud moment to see Year 11 students collecting a "brilliant set" of GCSE results.

"The atmosphere in the academy was wonderful as our students celebrated their hard work with friends, family and staff members who have been alongside them through every step of their journey," she said.

## Garforth's maximum pass rate

A 100% pass rate was secured by sixth formers at Garforth Academy.





Those taking vocational subjects achieved an average point score of 27.91.

Principal Anna Young said: "Another year of outstanding results at Key Stage 5 means all our students have managed to secure a destination of either university, apprenticeship or employment.

There are so many success stories I would not like to single out any individuals.

Our A-Level average point score puts us as one of the top performing Leeds schools for attainment.

It is also remarkable to see that our SEN students and those classed as disadvantaged outperformed the rest of the cohort, which is testament to



the hard work and efforts of all our students and staff."

It had been the first cohort taking T-Levels and they achieved a 100% pass rate.

"Being only one of a handful of schools in Leeds currently delivering T-Levels, it is impossible to compare our results but needless to say we are delighted with them," said Anna.

Four Trust academies participating in an innovative and ambitious programme aiming to help thousands gain high achievement in GCSE Latin have been joined by a fifth.

Carlton le Willows has joined Darton, De Warenne, Garforth and The Vale, and started the Department for Education's Latin Excellence Programme.

It supports schools to deliver an evidence-informed Latin curriculum designed to be accessible to all pupils aged 11 to 16.



Claire Hill, who took on the role of Lead Teacher of Latin in January, said KS3 and KS4 pupils spend up to an hour-and-a-half a week studying the subject.

"By taking part, pupils can access some of the wider benefits of a classical education, including improved literacy, broadened vocabulary, increased

academic resilience and access to empowering knowledge not usually available to state school students," said Claire.

Delta academies joined the programme in October 2023 and have since seen more than 100 students begin to learn Latin.

Students from Garforth and The Vale were successful finalists in a Latin fable writing competition, judged by historian Mary Beard.

Students received specially designed Roman coins and books as prizes for their efforts.

Since the start of the programme, Delta has become a hub for the teaching of Latin in the Yorkshire region and has hosted several conferences for students and CPD events to ensure staff are confident in the delivery of this ancient language and civilisation.

Claire said: "Students are really positive about their experience in Latin and regularly articulate the benefits of learning a language that is at the root of English, allowing them to make progress in not only English, but also in their MFL learning in French, Spanish and German."

One student from The Vale said: "I love Latin. It's like the coolest hobby ever!"

Students and staff from participating academies travelled to The Education Exchange for the Roman Civilisation Conference.

They enjoyed learning about Romulus and Remus and the foundations of Rome. They were even visited by the Goddess of Love, Venus.

In the afternoon, students had fun translating the fable of the Emperor and the Eels, where they discovered how cruel the Roman master could be to his slaves. The Latin Excellence Programme started in 2022. There are now around 2,700 students in non-selective state schools across England benefitting from it.

These activities took place before and after lessons or during lunchtime and breaks.



"Rock climbing tested their physical strength and determination, while canoeing required teamwork and coordination.






The caving expedition pushed them to face their fears and navigate through unfamiliar terrain, fostering a sense of adventure and resilience.
